

THE STREET UNIT

- Contact with sex workers working on the streets
- Accompanying them to health and social services and women's health clinics
- Harm reduction perspective
- Team of (male and female) social workers and cultural mediators

HARM REDUCTION

The work carried out on the streets, distributing health products (condoms and lubricating gel) and promoting prevention by distribution information leaflets, limits the spread of sexually transmitted diseases among the population at risk.

TARGET GROUP

The prevention and information work involves the sex workers directly and the sex workers' clients indirectly.



It is therefore also a service for the community.

INTERVENTIONS

- Monitoring the phenomenon (mapping surveys)
- Health prevention via awareness raising and information through the distribution of information materials and health products.
- Contact visits differentiated by target: Romania (Eastern and Trans-Europe), China, Nigeria
- Drop-in and guidance services in the community
- Accompanying to health services (Women's Health, Health Registration Service, Hospital – Infective Diseases and Gynaecology)

THE INVISIBLE PROJECT

Monitoring and contact visits in the field of INDOOR PROSTITUTION (since 2007)

- MONITORING THE PHENOMENON: data collection and entry in a regional database of advertisements linked to indoor prostitution published in newspapers and on the web; entry of the results of phone calls made by the social workers to sex workers.
- CONTACT WITH THE TARGET: through phone calls made by a social worker offering health prevention services.

The Invisible Project in 2017

- ADVERTISEMENTS PLACED: 1218 (prevalent source: Web)
- NATIONALITIES: Not Defined, oriental, italian and South american
- PHONE CALLS MADE: 407 (315 women, 51 trans, 18 men, 10 pairs and transvestites)

EXPERIMENTAL ACTIONS

- MEN'S PROJECT: action aiming to monitor and investigate male prostitution
- MASSAGE CENTRE PROJECT: action aiming to study the phenomenon of prostitution in massage centres

EXIT PATH: INTERVENTIONS

Initial contact with victims

Welcome service: emergencies, hospitality, semi-independence

EXIT PATH: INTERVENTIONS

Regularisation (residence permit and passport)

Literacy and education

Family reunification

Support to repatriation

SOME KEY ELEMENTS

- Local and national networking (Anti-trafficking freephone number)
- Cooperation among volunteers and social workers for victim support services
- Implementation of initial contact and emergence strategies
- Links with asylum seeker services (hospitality and Territorial Commissions)
- Paths for specific targets (women with children, transexuals, ex minors)

Exit paths in 2017

- **50** individual paths (men, women, trans), of those:
- 20 new ones in the year
- 39 Nigerian women
- Prevalent age group: 18-24 years (50%)
- 26 literacy and education courses
- 3 vocational training courses
- 20 internships
- 10 paths successfully completed in the year
